Lullabies and Realities

We hum a soothing melody to lull a baby to sleep. This time of year lullabies make their way into our liturgies as we sing Christmas carols that are slumber songs for the baby Jesus. We imagine the peace and serenity of the first Christmas. All is calm, all is bright. Until the night that Joseph, warned by a message from God, wakes Mary and tells her they must flee. Herod, threatened by the birth of their baby, seeks to destroy him. These young parents must protect their child from harm and leave immediately for Egypt. They wonder into what kind of world their son has been born.

From the moment of his birth, Jesus' presence challenges all claims to earthly authority. This one who brings God's reign of justice and peace evokes a hostile response. What a stark reminder that Christmas is more than sentimentality. Life in the real world brings violence, poverty, sadness, and grief.

Along with all the good in life there is also the shadow side to humanity, including tyrants and powers that take away the lives of innocent people. You can hear the weeping: parents of the infants killed by Herod weeping for their children; loved ones of the deceased weeping at Ground Zero; families of victims of war and violence weeping for their beloved ones.

The lullaby that God sings to us is not the promise that we will never know despair or a broken heart. Life has a way of surprising us with realities of its own. Yet at our baptism God sings us a lullaby of peace for all our days. We gather one day after Christmas to hear tidings of comfort and joy, and to receive comfort from the word and at the Lord's table. We go forth to sing, even in the midst of violence and pain. We go forth to sing God's lullaby of hope to one another and to our world.



SECOND READING: Hebrews 2:10-18

Though Christmas is a joyous season, its meaning cannot be separated from the message of Holy Week. Jesus became like us in order to suffer with us and to destroy the power of death.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, ¹²saying,

"I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters,

in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

¹³And again,

"I will put my trust in him."

And again,

"Here am I and the children whom God has given me."


¹⁴Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, ¹⁵and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. ¹⁶For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. ¹⁷Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. ¹⁸Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.



GOSPEL: Matthew 2:13-23

Matthew describes the terrible slaughter of young Bethlehem boys as a sign of evil present in the world and to show the relationship between the scriptures and Jesus' life.

Now after the wise men had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." ¹⁴Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, ¹⁵ and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called my son."

¹⁶When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. ¹⁷Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah:

¹⁸"A voice was heard in Ramah,

wailing and loud lamentation,

Rachel weeping for her children;

she refused to be consoled, because they are no more."

¹⁹When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, ²⁰"Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child's life are dead." ²¹Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. ²²But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. ²³There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, "He will be called a Nazorean."
