Introduction

This Sunday’s image of the life the risen Christ shares with us is the image of friendship. We are called to serve others as Jesus came to serve; but for John’s gospel, the image of servanthood is too hierarchical, too distant, to capture the essence of life with Christ. Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other. This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.

FIRST READING: Acts 10:44-48

While Peter shares the good news of Jesus with a Gentile soldier and his family, the Holy Spirit comes upon them. Recognizing that the Spirit works inclusively in the lives of both Jews and Gentiles, Peter commands that these Gentiles also be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

⁴⁴While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. ⁴⁵The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, ⁴⁶for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, ⁴⁷“Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?” ⁴⁸So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days.

SECOND READING: 1 John 5:1-6

God's children believe that Jesus is the Messiah and love God by keeping God's commandments. Thus the world is conquered not through military might but through love and faith.

¹Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the parent loves the child. ²By this we know that we

love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments. ³For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, ⁴for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. ⁵Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God? ⁶This is the one who came by water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth.

GOSPEL: John 15:9-17

On the night of his arrest, Jesus delivers a final testimony to his disciples to help them in the days ahead. Here, he repeats the most important of all his commands, that they love one another.

[Jesus said:] ⁹“As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father’s commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy

may be complete.

12“This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. 13No one has greater love than this, to lay down one’s life for one’s friends. 14You are my friends if you do what I command you. 15I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. 16You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. 17I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.”

SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

What Kind of Love?

When William Penn established Pennsylvania he called the settlement Philadelphia, which means "city of brotherly love." Reflecting his English Quaker ideals, Penn wanted people to live in peaceful harmony and to be open to all and tolerant of all.

Commanding us to love "as I have loved you" (John 15:12), Jesus commends love on a higher plain than sisterly or brotherly love. His is the love shown in Jerusalem on Good Friday; we are to love as he did on the cross, with a costly outpouring of life for all.

The Easter season celebrates the resurrection with the dark silhouette of the cross behind its blazing light. Jesus reached resurrection glory only through death, and while human nature prefers the easy road of trying to love without cost, cross-love is different. For Jesus there was no crown without a cross. We, too, must die in order to live.

Jesus commands us to love with Good Friday love, not mere tolerance or goodwill, though they, too, are important. He commands us to love the undeserving and those who revile and speak ill of us. To love the poor and downtrodden. To love the neighbor next door and the one 3,000 miles away. Faithful love is not a triumphal quest that pays no heed to sin's power; in point of fact, true love absorbs the shock of evil and death.

This is Jerusalem love. While others can teach us about brotherly love, only Christ shows us self-giving and costly-unto-death love. From him we learn that God is love, and that we love like him when our hearts beat with the compassion of God.
