

COMMENT

When I think bsck to my ordination vows, it seems to m that I promised to keep my eyes open for prospective pastors, particularly among the young, and to encourage them in that direction. Over the years, there was one such young man whom I began to encourage. However, he and his family left the church and I had no further contact with him.

Toledo Lutheran Colleagues met recently at Epiphany Lutheran, in part to learn the congregation's history. What impressed me, again, is the history of some twenty men and women nurtured and sent off into the ministry. Two sitting pastors had much influence on the young. However, the congregation, also, took its role seriously. That rekindled memory of my own home congregation when at least once a month, someone would stop me on a Sunday morning to ask me if I was still thinking of the ministry. Epiphany's latest pastoral prodigy was present at our meeting. The presider asked David Frye about

encouragement he received from congregant. He replied, "There were people in the congregation who knew I would become a pastor before I knew it!" For whatever future time I have left, David's words will stick with me more than any other words spoken at that gathering. How unfortunate the congregations that never felt God's direction to encourage their young to consider the ministry.

ASCENSION DAY: WHERE DID JESUS GO? (AND WALTER, ALSO?)

In my first call, I became the second pastor of an ALC, 1960s mission package congregation, planted in north central New Jersey. (Both the LCA and LC-MS already had established congregations in the area.) This new, struggling congregation had three origins of members. First came the lifelong residents of this area with its seven, beautiful, inland lakes. Second were those who grew up in the five boroughs of New York City and moved 35 miles west to escape the complexities of the "Big Apple". Third were people from all over the country whose companies had brought them to their main offices in NYC. Nearly half of these people were 7AM-7PM commuters to and from their workplaces in New York. Thus, weekday church events could never begin earlier than 8 PM. Each of these groups had their own ideas about what church should be like, especially at the holidays. The folks from the Midwest wanted Christmas to be just like it was back in Iowa, Wisconsin or Minnesota. The Staten Islanders were firm in their unique traditions. The locals --- not so rigid. There was a lot of push/pull --- and disagreement.

One morning, my telephone rang. A man who identified himself as Walter was calling from California. He told me that his company was transferring him to their New York office. Out in California, he and his family had poured over maps and decided to relocate to the area of New Jersey where I was serving. Secondly, they took out an ALC Handbook and spotted our congregation in the area to which they would move. Sight unseen, they would join our congregation and --- church was very important to them. In a week, Walter was flying east to begin the move process. He hoped to meet me and could I line him up with a reliable real estate agent? (Walter wanted to rent, not own.)

Right on schedule, Walter appeared in my office. We had a great visit. For lunch, we went to a local restaurant where the real estate agent whom I recruited would meet us. That, too, was a great visit. After lunch, I went on my way and the other two set off househunting.

The next morning, Walter called me from his hotel room. Everything was falling into place. He thanked me for his visit, said that a house had been lined up for his family, and that they would move into their new home in 4 to 6 weeks. I couldn't have been more eager for this new family to come on board. Gifts from God!

Four weeks went by. Nothing. Six weeks. Nothing. At eight weeks, Walter called up. "Kurt. Since you and I met, my family has had some long, hard conversations. I am leaving my job after 15 years. We are moving back home to North Dakota to start over, again. We will probably open our own business there."

Now, I understand Jesus. He came to us on assignment from "his company". He completed his assignment and went back up north to North Dakota! Happy Ascension Day, May 9!

ARTICLE: CONGREGATIONS; PAST AND FUTURE

Pastor Kevin Maxey – Hope Lutheran

Last week I attended the Toledo Conference gathering of rostered leaders in the ELCA at Epiphany on Reynolds. The group meets most months, September through May and the last couple of years we have spent time exploring the story of each congregation. Epiphany is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year and traces it roots to being a mission congregation started by our mission partner Salem. Epiphany also sent members and dollars to found Providence Lutheran on Airport Highway as growth took more and more people westward.

As we have heard the story of the different congregations around Toledo, I have found the experience to be very enlightening. As one who has never served or been a member of these congregations has meant that it feels a little like looking in from the outside. In most of the congregations a long-time member or leader has shared the history and how that history is framed is always interesting. I also find myself interested in the assessment of the current state and mission of the congregation.

At Epiphany one of the stories that was shared was from the time prior to Toledo

expanding into Adams Township when the congregation hosted kindergarten for the children during the week and the Sunday School had nearly 900 children and was split into two sessions each Sunday with a class even meeting in the boiler room.

I think part of my interest in hearing the stories these last years comes out of St. Luke in Newburgh, Indiana, where I served as a pastor. My time there came after the congregation had existed for 10 years after the merger of two small congregations and the relocation to a place of rapid growth. There were three distinct groups with three distinct stories of the congregation. There was a group from each of the two congregations that came together and a third group who had joined since the new congregation began and didn't have any connection to the predecessors. It was common to hear "at _____ we always did it this way." The third group finally grew tired of hearing how it had been done and would gently say, "We are St. Luke not __."

A common thread in every congregation and in every story is the challenges that the congregation has experienced and might now be experiencing. Every story is filled with challenges and while there have been some challenges that many congregations have faced that are often tied to congregational life cycles, most of the challenges are very diverse.

During the Easter season the stories from Acts replace the Old Testament readings in the lectionary. I have been reminded that Acts, which is the Gospel of the Holy Spirit, is about sharing the stories of the challenges the young church experienced and how the Spirit guided the church through those challenges. There has never been a time which the Christian church has been without some challenge. To be sure the challenges have changed but they have been challenges none the less.

In the last few years, I have heard many comments about the status of the church and the challenges we now face following the pandemic. We (the universal church) indeed are facing challenges we haven't experienced before, but we are facing them with the same Holy Spirit that has nurtured the church for 2,000 years. God has been faithful and sustained the church in each and every challenge it has ever faced. We may face new challenges but we do so with the Holy Spirit at our side.
