Confession and Forgiveness

P: In the name of the Father, and of the \pm Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

P: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

C: Amen

P: If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

(Silence for reflection and self-examination.)

P: Most merciful God,

C: we confess that we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen

P: Almighty God, in his mercy, has given his Son to die for us and, for his sake, forgives us all our sins. As a called and ordained minister of the Church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Announcements

Introduction

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 17:22-24

Tree imagery is used in a messianic prophecy to tell how the Lord will choose someone from Judah's royal family (the cedar tree) to reign over all creation. This tree will be planted on Mount Zion, the location of the holy temple

²²Thus says the Lord God: I myself will take a sprig

from the lofty top of a cedar;

I will set it out.

I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs;

I myself will plant it

on a high and lofty mountain.

²³On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it,

in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar.

Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind.

²⁴All the trees of the field shall know

that I am the Lord. I bring low the high tree,

I make high the low tree;

I dry up the green tree

and make the dry tree flourish.

I the Lord have spoken;

I will accomplish it.

Reader: Word of God, Word of life.

PSALM: Psalm 92:1-4, 12-15 - Congregation responds in BOLD.

¹ It is good to give thanks to the LORD, to sing praises to your name, O Most High; ² to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night,

³ to the music of the lute and the harp, to the melody of the lyre.

⁴ For you, O LORD, have made me glad by your work; at the works of your hands I sing for joy.

¹²The righteous flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

¹³ They are planted in the house of the LORD; they flourish in the courts of our God.

¹⁴ In old age they still produce fruit; they are always green and full of sap, ¹⁵ showing that the LORD is upright;

he is my rock, and there is no unrighteousness in him.

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:6-10 [11-13] 14-17

Paul encourages believers to live by faith and not by sight. We do not consider Jesus from a human perspective but through the eyes of faith, believing he died for all and was raised. All who are in Christ are now in God's new creation.

⁶So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—⁷for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

[11Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. ¹²We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. ¹³For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you.] ¹⁴For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. ¹⁵And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.


¹⁶From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

Jesus frequently uses parables to teach ordinary people as they are able to hear and understand. Images of sowing and growing show the vitality of God's kingdom.

²⁶[Jesus] said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷ and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

³⁰He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? ³¹It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; ³²yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

³³With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; ³⁴he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

P: Graduates, let the words of the Lord in Proverbs 3 speak to you today. The Lord says, "Do not forget My teaching, but let your heart keep My commandments." (v. 1)

C: Blessed is the one who finds wisdom, and the one who gets understanding." (v. 13)

P: Let us pray. Lord God, we commend these young people to Your care, asking You in all things to watch over them and to keep them in Your grace in Christ Jesus.

C: Help them when they share their troubles with You. Hear and bless them when they ask for Your help and guidance.

P: Help them to be strong in their faith in Jesus Christ, who lived, died, and rose again so that we may know the Father's love and live in the Father's grace. "Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave Himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 5:2). Remember God's love.

C: Remember our love and support for you our sisters and brothers in the family of God.

P: The Lord be with you.

- P: And so, with Mary Magdalene and Peter and all the witnesses of the resurrection, with earth and sea and all their creatures, and with angels and archangels, cherubim and seraphim, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:





- P: You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God. You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory. You so loved the world that you gave your only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. We give you thanks for his coming into the world to fulfill for us your holy will and to accomplish all things for our salvation.
- P: In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to is disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.
- P: Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.
- P: For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from the cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

C: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

P: To you, O God, Father, + Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.

P: The God of all, who raised + Jesus from the dead, bless you by the power of the Holy Spirit to live in the new creation..

A Peaceful Sleep

Summertime can bring some of our most violent storms; evening cool hits daytime heat and the ominous clouds lead us to check storm warnings on TV. Strong claps of thunder and flashes of lightning can startle us right out of bed, shuffling to check open windows, make sure pets or children are tucked in, wonder whether to move plants or yard furniture out of harm's way. It's hard to sleep peacefully through the anxiety a storm can bring.

But Jesus does it! It's a "great windstorm," a terrible, furious, violent storm. The disciples would not have needed a warning siren to know their boat should clearly have been headed ashore for safety. They were afraid, so afraid that they woke Jesus up--Jesus, don't you care that we're dying here?

When we question whether God just sleeps through our pain and anxiety, this passage might seem to confirm our isolation. But Jesus can sleep because of the gift he possesses, a gift he shares: peace. Stillness. Calm.

Who can be this calm during a terrible storm? The one who was there at the beginning when the Spirit of God moved over the face of the waters, the one who kept Noah safe through the flood, the one who gave the enslaved Israelites their escape through the Red Sea, the one who was baptized in the Jordan and saw the heavens torn apart, the one who had blood and water pour from his wounded side.

Is your summer vacation anything but a vacation? To a world longing for inner peace, seeking it in books and spa treatments and scented candles, the answer comes from one undaunted by anything the earth offers. Even death holds no fear because he has turned it upside down and given us eternal life. Let us sleep then in the peace of Christ.
