Confession and Forgiveness

Introduction

Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 2:1-5

In 597 BCE, the priest Ezekiel was removed into exile in Babylon. While there, he received a vision of God appearing majestically on a chariot throne. Today's

reading recounts God's commissioning of Ezekiel during this vision. The prophet is to speak God's word to a people unwilling to hear.

¹ [A voice] said to me: O mortal, stand up on your feet, and I will speak with you.² And when he spoke to me, a spirit entered into me and set me on my feet; and I heard him speaking to me. ³ He said to me, Mortal, I am sending you to the people of Israel, to a nation of rebels who have rebelled against me; they and their ancestors have transgressed against me to this very day. ⁴ The descendants are impudent and stubborn. I am sending you to them, and you shall say to them, "Thus says the Lord God." ⁵ Whether they hear or refuse to hear (for they are a rebellious house), they shall know that there has been a prophet among them.

Reader: Word of God, Word of life.

C: Thanks be to God.

PSALM: Psalm 123 - Congregation responds in BOLD.

¹ To you I lift up my eyes, O you who are enthroned in the heavens! ² As the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of a maid to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the LORD our God, until he has mercy upon us.

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 12:2-10

Christians do not boast of their own accomplishments. Rather, Christian boasting focuses attention on how the power of Christ is present in our lives, especially in times of weakness and vulnerability. No matter what our circumstances in life, Christ's grace is sufficient for us.

²I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows. ³ And I know that such a person—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows—⁴ was caught up into Paradise and heard things that are not to be told, that no mortal is permitted to repeat. ⁵ On behalf of such a one I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. ⁶ But if I wish to boast, I will not be a fool, for I will be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think

better of me than what is seen in me or heard from me, ⁷ even considering the exceptional character of the revelations. Therefore, to keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. ⁸ Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, ⁹ but he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. ¹⁰ Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.



GOSPEL: Mark 6:1-13

At home and abroad, Jesus and his disciples encounter resistance as they seek to proclaim God's word and relieve affliction.

¹ [Jesus] came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him.² On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! ³ Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. ⁴ Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." ⁵ And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. ⁶ And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Have mercy upon us, O LORD, have mercy upon us, for we have had more than enough of contempt.
 Our soul has had more than its fill of the scorn of those who are at ease, of the contempt of the proud.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. ⁷ He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸ He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; ⁹ but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. ¹⁰ He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. ¹¹ If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." ¹² So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. ¹³ They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

- P: Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.
- P: For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from the cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

DAMON COLEMAN

Cellist Damon Coleman began his cello studies through the Suzuki method in his hometown of Detroit, Michigan. During high school, Damon studied cello with members of the Detroit Symphony and University of Michigan faculty. He did his undergraduate work at the



Eastman School of Music as a student of Paul Katz. cellist of the Cleveland Quartet. Damon was a member of the New World Symphony in Miami Beach for four years, serving as a principal cellist his last two seasons. He has appeared in masterclasses with cellists including Janos Starker, Lynn Harrell, and Mstislav Rostropovich. Damon has been the principal cellist of the Kalamazoo Symphony, the Memphis Opera, the Flint Symphony, and the Michigan Chamber Orchestra. He has served as a faculty member of the Miami School for the Arts, the Ann Arbor School for the Arts, the New England Music Camp, The PRIZM Music Festival, and the University of Toledo. In addition, Damon is a recipient of the King-Chávez-Parks Visiting Professorship from the University of Michigan. He has performed concerts of the solo Bach suites on international tours, and has been heard throughout the concert halls of North America, South America, and Europe. Damon currently maintains a private teaching studio in the Sylvania area. He is the Associate Principal cellist of the Toledo Symphony, and performs chamber music as the cellist of the Bezonian Piano Trio. He is also a yearly participant in the Sphinx Music Festival, where he regularly serves as a principal cellist.

Packing like a Prophet

Many families take a trip during summer vacation, snowbirds head north for cooler weather, youth groups set out on mission trips, and kids go to camp. Often these trips involve vans, buses, and RVs loaded down with every supply imaginable. It takes days to shop and prepare for a big journey. It still involves significant planning even if you're only filling one small piece of carry-on luggage for the plane or train.

But when Jesus instructs his disciples in today's gospel, his list includes almost nothing! He lists more things to exclude than to include: he orders them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. Sandals, a staff, and the clothes on their backs. That's all.

Though Jesus often teaches about reducing our possessions, today's good news is not simply about material things. Jesus is trying to give the disciples the freedom they need to focus on their mission: proclaiming repentance, casting out demons, and curing the sick. Jesus doesn't want his disciples distracted by too much stuff; he wants them to be fully present to those they are being sent to serve. This mission is about repentance, authority over unclean spirits, healing, and preparation for the extraordinary news of the cross.

May this message refresh all our travels, both distant and local, this summertime. Today Jesus releases us from our earthly distractions, giving us the freedom to prepare our hearts for his message of repentance and forgiveness. His forgiving kind of love allows us to journey with unburdened and attentive hearts. Therefore, our packing list for this summer includes carrying the good news of Jesus through our generosity and hospitality toward the new and familiar folks we meet, doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with our God.
