Confession and Forgiveness

P: In the name of the Father, and of the † Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

P: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

C: Amen

P: If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

P: Almighty God, in his mercy, has given his Son to die for us and, for his sake, forgives us all our sins. As a called and ordained minister of the Church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the † Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Introduction

Wisdom prepares a feast, sets her table, and invites all to come and eat her bread and drink her wine. The first chapter of John’s gospel owes much to the biblical tradition that imagined Wisdom as existing before anything was created and having a role in the work of creation. Christ, the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:24), today invites us to eat his flesh and drink his blood. John’s gospel includes no account of the institution of the Lord’s supper, but here we can’t help hearing Jesus’ words as an invitation to the meal of bread and wine we share

FIRST READING: Proverbs 9:1-6

Wisdom is portrayed as a woman who invites people to partake of her banquet. Just as ordinary food is necessary for physical life, Wisdom’s food—insight and understanding—is necessary for fullness of life with God. Partaking of Wisdom’s banquet is the way to life.

¹Wisdom has built her house,
 she has hewn her seven pillars.
²She has slaughtered her animals, she has mixed her wine,
 she has also set her table.
³She has sent out her servant-girls, she calls
 from the highest places in the town,
⁴“You that are simple, turn in here!”
 To those without sense she says,
⁵“Come, eat of my bread
 and drink of the wine I have mixed.
⁶Lay aside immaturity, and live,
 and walk in the way of insight.”

Reader: Word of God, Word of life.
C: Thanks be to God.

PSALM: Psalm 34:9-14- Congregation responds in **BOLD**.

⁹O fear the LORD, you his holy ones,
 for those who fear him have no want.
¹⁰ **The young lions suffer want and hunger,
 but those who seek the LORD lack no good thing.**

¹¹ Come, O children, listen to me;
 I will teach you the fear of the LORD.
¹² **Which of you desires life,
 and covets many days to enjoy good?**

⁵ Look to him, and be radiant;
 so your faces shall never be ashamed.
⁶ **This poor soul cried, and was heard by the LORD,
 and was saved from every trouble.**

¹³ Keep your tongue from evil,
 and your lips from speaking deceit.
¹⁴ **Depart from evil, and do good;

SECOND READING: Ephesians 5:15-20

True wisdom integrates our new reality in Christ with our Christian fellowship and daily conduct. Because we are filled with the Spirit, Christians regularly rejoice together, give thanks to God for one another, and care for one another. In this way we revere our Lord Jesus Christ.

¹⁵Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, ¹⁶making the most of the time, because the days are evil. ¹⁷So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. ¹⁸Do not get drunk with wine, for

that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, ¹⁹as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, ²⁰giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Announcement

GOSPEL: John 6:51-58

In John’s gospel, the feeding of the five thousand leads to extended teaching in which Jesus identifies himself as the true “bread of life.” Finally, in these verses, he makes a connection that would not be understood until after his death, in light of the church’s celebration of holy communion.

[Jesus said,] ⁵¹“I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh.”

⁵²The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, “How can this man give us his flesh to eat?” ⁵³So Jesus said to them, “Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. ⁵⁴Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; ⁵⁵for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. ⁵⁶Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. ⁵⁷Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. ⁵⁸This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever.”

The Great Thanksgiving

P: The Lord be with you.

 comes in the name of the Lord. Ho-san - na in the high - est.

P: You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God. You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory. You so loved the world that you gave your only Son, so that everyone who

believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. We give you thanks for his coming into the world to fulfill for us your holy will and to accomplish all things for our salvation.

P: In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

P: Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

P: For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from the cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

C: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

P: To you, O God, Father, † Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.

C: Amen.

P: Remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:

The Lord's Prayer (*prayed by all*)

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name,
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us;

And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power,
and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Invitation to Communion

P: Come and know Christ, broken and poured out for you.

C: We come at our Lord's command.

The Communion (*distribution will be continuous*)

All baptized Christians, believing that our Lord Jesus Christ is truly present in the bread and wine of Holy Communion, bringing to us the gift of forgiveness and the promise of eternal life, are welcome to gather at the Lord's table. Infants, children and others who have not been baptized are welcome to come to receive a blessing; please make an X with your arms across your chest."

If you wish to receive apple juice instead of wine, place your hand

over your shoulder as you approach the person distributing the wine.

(After all have received communion, please stand.)

P: Now may the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen you and keep you in God's grace.

C: Amen.

Dana Cornell Baker was born and raised in Toledo Ohio, where he grew up in a singing family full of musicians and has been singing for over 40 years, doing numerous solo concerts and performing as a featured soloist, including at weddings and funerals.

He was involved in musical theater at the Toledo Repertoire Theatre and the Toledo Opera. Dana was also cast in "Porgy and Bess" in 1998 at the Detroit Opera, as, "Jim", which was life-changing for him, performing with Multi-Award Winner, Peabo Bryson, as "Sporting Life."

Dana moved to Nashville for 12 years and was part of the praise team at New River Fellowship Church, under the music direction of Christian music icon, Michael W. Smith. Abide in Me

In the Hebrew Scriptures, "Wisdom" is not some distant abstraction, but an earthy woman. Not only has she set her table, but she has built her house and chopped the wood for it. To provide the feast of insight she gets hands and feet dirty, slaughtering animals and mixing wine. Her guest list highlights those most in need of her, the senseless and the simple. Wisdom is not beyond us but among us, immersing herself in the chaotic processes that yield a creation of wonder.

In today's gospel, Jesus utters earthy wisdom: his flesh is true food, his blood is true drink, given for the life of the world. One must consume them in order to live.

The crowd recoils: "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" But the prospect is hardly alien. In the womb, each of us derives indispensable nourishment through our mother's blood. Outside the womb, the first food for many of us is milk produced by our mother's body.

"You are what you eat," we say. Eventually the food we eat becomes our own flesh. "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood," Jesus says, "abide in me and I in them." The promise of these startling words is intimacy with God--a link between spirit and flesh that is stronger than death. The word made flesh dwells not only among us but within us, tirelessly bringing forth through earthy processes the new creation of wonder and joy. We have only to eat and drink--to allow ourselves to receive.

The bread that we break, the cup of blessing that we bless, are a sharing in the body and blood of Christ. We who are many are one: blood brothers and sisters of Jesus and of one another, all invited to Wisdom's everlasting feast.
