<u>Lighting the Advent Wreath—The First Candle</u> First Sunday in Advent: Hope

- P: As our days grow shorter and our nights longer, we who are people of faith turn to symbols such as candles, evergreens, and wreaths to proclaim our belief in the unquenchable light. In hopeful anticipation, we prepare for the coming of the Reign of God.
- C: We open our hearts to the Living Word of God, the true Light of the World.
- P: Every year we light candles as we prepare for the coming of Christ. More and more candles, more and more light, as we watch and wait for Jesus, the Light of the World.

(The first Advent candle is lit)

- C: God of Promise, come into our darkness. Renew your hope in us, for you alone bring life out of death.
- P: Receive God's promise of hope from Psalm 33:

 The eyes of the LORD are on those who fear him,
 on those whose hope is in his unfailing love,
 to deliver them from death and keep them alive in famine.
- C: We wait in hope for the LORD; he is our help and our shield. In him our hearts rejoice, for we trust in his holy name. May your unfailing love rest upon us, O LORD, even as we put our hope in you.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Cleared Vision

Now and then, the landscapes and images of ancient scripture mirror our own time so eerily that we catch our breath in amazement. Today's gospel provides such an example. Distress among nations. Fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world. Powers shaken. Yes--we know about these things.

Upset and unease around the globe, reported with unrelenting vigor, may at times threaten to overwhelm us. Wars. Biological weapons. Health epidemics. Human cloning. Overpopulation. Famine. Environmental degradation. These are things that may cause general anxiety. But often, the real terrors are the day-to-day fears. Will I have enough to live on in my old age? Does anyone *really* know me? Are my children responsible, healthy, compassionate? Will I ever be happy? Have I made the right decisions about what to do with my life? Is this all there is? These human-scale worries loom large in our imaginations.

When we are haunted by worry, when our notion of who we are and what we are about seems shaken and unsteady, then, oddly enough, we are most prepared to recognize Jesus when he comes. Formidable circumstances, within or beyond our control, can bring us face to face with our need of a savior. Anxious times bring with them this clarity of vision--a vision harder to come by when everything is just as we think it should be.

On this first Sunday in Advent we are reminded again that the coming of Jesus brings only blessed consequences for those who watch for his coming with faith and hope. Jesus' presence does not guarantee a quick end to our anxieties, but does assure us that they will come to an end, and that in the meantime we are never alone. In word, meal, and the gathered body of Christ, we hear and taste and touch the presence of the one who will not let us go.
