<u>Introduction</u>

The Sundays after Epiphany continue to celebrate the revelation of God's glory to us as it was made known to the magi and to those on Jordan's banks at Jesus' baptism--today using wedding imagery. Our God rejoices over God's people as those being married rejoice over one another. By the power of the Spirit there are gifts galore for everyone. In Christ Jesus the best wine is saved for last. Taste and see

FIRST READING: Isaiah 62:1-5

The people's return to Judah after the exile was marred by economic and political troubles. Nevertheless, the prophet declares, Jerusalem and Judah will be restored. God will rejoice over Jerusalem as a bridegroom rejoices over the bride, and the people are called to the celebration.

¹ For Zion's sake I will not keep silent, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until her vindication shines out like the dawn, and her salvation like a burning torch.

² The nations shall see your vindication, and all the kings your glory; and you shall be called by a new name that the mouth of the Lord will give.

³ You shall be a crown of beauty in the hand of the Lord, and a royal diadem in the hand of your God.

⁴ You shall no more be termed Forsaken, and your land shall no more be termed Desolate; but you shall be called My Delight Is in Her, and your land Married;

for the Lord delights in you,

and your land shall be married.

⁵ For as a young man marries a young woman, so shall your builder marry you, and as the bridegroom rejoices over the bride, so shall your God rejoice over you.

PSALM: Psalm 36:5-10 — Congregation responds in **BOLD**.

⁵ Your steadfast love, O LORD, extends to the heavens, your faithfulness to the clouds.

⁶ Your righteousness is like the mighty mountains, your judgments are like the great deep; you save humans and animals alike, O LORD.

⁷ How precious is your steadfast love, O God! All people may take refuge in the shadow of your wings. ⁸ They feest on the abundance of your bouse.

⁸ They feast on the abundance of your house, and you give them drink from the river of your delights.

⁹ For with you is the fountain of life; in your light we see light.

¹⁰ O continue your steadfast love to those who know you, and your salvation to the upright of heart!

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

The congregation at Corinth experienced division as people were comparing their spiritual gifts, thinking some to be superior to others. Paul invites this fractured community to trust that God's Holy Spirit has gifted them all perfectly for their mission together.

¹ Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. ² You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. ³ Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴ Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; ⁵ and there are

varieties of services, but the same Lord; ⁶ and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. ⁷ To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. ⁸ To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹ to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰ to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹ All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

GOSPEL: John 2:1-11

Turning water to wine at the wedding at Cana is described as the first of Jesus' signs. Through many such epiphanies, Jesus reveals that he bears God's creative power and joyful presence into the world.

¹ On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They

have no wine." ⁴ And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." ⁶ Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. ⁹ When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." ¹¹ Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

ISAIAH 117 HOUSE

"Changing how Foster Care Begins"

This month's monthly ministry focus will again be the Isaiah 117 House in Lucas County. The Isaiah 117 project exists to reduce trauma on removal day for children who are being placed in the foster care system. The house helps lighten the load for caseworkers and ease transition into foster care by creating a 'home' environment where children on removal day can go instead of an office while caseworkers work on placement. This home provides the comforts of home and lessens the impact.

Even better, an Isaiah 117 home is planned for Oregon / East Toledo! Genacross Lutheran Services has donated a half-acre of land in Oregon, Ohio, and the surveying of the land is being donated. The general contractor, Jim Moline with Moline Builders is actively reaching out to suppliers and subcontractors. But, we need your help! FSJ is joining other Lutheran churches in the area on taking up a collection to help fund the home's creation. 2ND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

Simple Signs, Great Gifts

Perhaps it shouldn't be surprising that Jesus' first sign took place at an otherwise ordinary wedding. After all, Jesus was the stable-born son of an unremarkable carpenter and his wife. The poor, downtrodden, and oppressed were often the beneficiaries of Jesus' mercy and figured prominently in his teachings. In fact, the entire New Testament could be considered a caution against thinking that there is any place or any person too lowly to be lifted up by the power of the Holy Spirit.

This was the beginning of Jesus' ministry, and it may seem a modest one, but it reveals a profound truth. The water in the stone pots was set aside for ritual purification, according to Jewish law. Jesus replaced this water with wine. In the same way, he would replace the old relationship, the old rituals, with a new covenant—a wedding, if you will—with God. He did this through the blood shed in his victorious sacrifice for us. The simple sign enacted at this wedding points to an event that restored joy and life.

This same symbolism is repeated weekly in our churches. When we celebrate the Lord's supper, we recall God's covenant with us and the sacrifice Jesus made for the forgiveness of our sin. Like the wedding guests in Cana, there may be nothing special about us. We may be--in fact, before God we all are--lowly and undeserving. But God offers us a gift beyond measure.

Without the wine, the wedding feast at Cana would not have been as joyous. Jesus "saved" the party. And Christ's sacrifice, brought to us in the sacrament of Holy Communion, saves us all.
